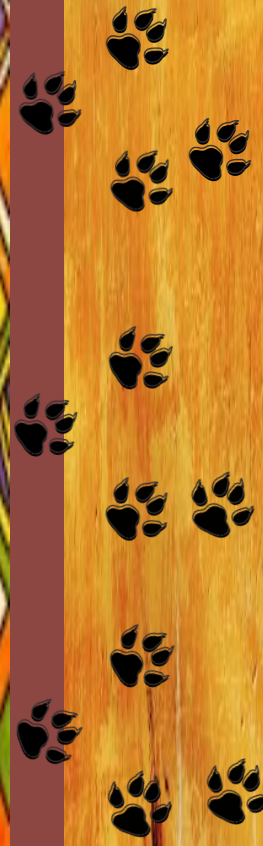

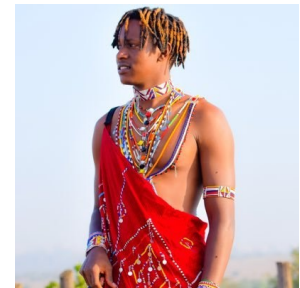
6. Go on a safari to find out how Richard's life is different from your life. Think about your neighborhood, clothing, what you eat, and what you do to help your family around the house, etc.

SHELLY POLLOCK, AUTHOR



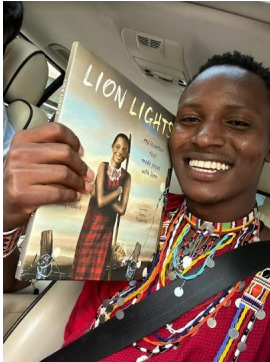
Shelly is a retired teacher with a bachelor's degree in Elementary Education and a Master's Degree in Special Education. For over twenty-five years she taught children and adults helping them in remedial reading and remedial math.

Her debut picture book, LION LIGHTS, is co-authored with Richard Turere. It has won The California Reading Association Eureka Silver Award for Non-fiction and the National Science Teaching Association (NSTA) Outstanding Science Trade Book Award. Shelly's hope is that LION LIGHTS will inspire children everywhere to realize that they can do amazing things, too.

After retiring, Shelly and her husband, Kim, sold their home and furnishing to explore North America in their RV and Jeep for fourteen years. As they explored the country and the world, she collected and wrote stories for children. Writing on a moving table was quite a challenge! They finally settled in St. George, Utah where when not writing, you'll likely find her enjoying yoga, hiking, backcountry off-roading, exploring rock art, and biking.

Richard graduated from the African Leadership University where he majored in Global Challenges with a focus on wildlife conservation. He shared his Lion Lights with the world at the TED Global Stage in California. He received a special commendation from Africa Leadership Awards for his critical role in protecting and creating awareness around the crisis facing lions in Kenya. He is recognized as Kenya's youngest patent inventor, and, in 2018, received the Anzisha prize award. In 2020, he became a National Geographic Young Explorer, and he was a finalist in the Future for Nature awards in 2021.
